AJ v. National Bank	Bank=monopoly and only for elite, AJ believes unconstitutional despite McCulloch v. Maryland National Bank prevented state banks from giving low interest loans by monitoring paper money supply AJ vetoes extended banks charter in 1832, but charter does not run out until 1836, AJ feels people have issued a mandate to get rid of the bank
Whig's	New political party=strong federal government Named after Whig party in England that worked to limit the king's power
Martin Van Buren	Handpicked successor of AJ No chance to succeed Panic of 1837
"Tippecanoe and Tyler Too"	William Henry Harrison and John Tyler Whig candidates For president in 1840, Harrison dies 32 day into office Tyler takes over, acts more like a Democrat than Whig Webster-Ashburton Treaty=US Canadian border set
